## **History:**

The following sketch of the two families was copied from the *49<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Rural Life Edition*, 1939, of the Boonville Missouri Advertiser:

"Samuel Redd came to Missouri in 1836 from Louisa County, Virginia. He purchased one section of land from General William Ashley. A two-room log house had already been built by 1836, and two log cabins in the yard housed the slaves who came with Mr. Redd from Virginia.

The Gibson family also came to Missouri from Louisa County, Virginia. They settled in Howard County, Missouri. Their son, Thomas B. Gibson, married Lucy Redd and they began their married life in Howard County, but when Lucy inherited a part of her father's estate in Cooper County, they moved to the old Redd homestead, which by that time had been built onto and was an attractive nine-room residence.

The negro men and women who had come from Virginia with their former master had lived, and died here and were buried on this farm."

In 1939 the Gibson home was still standing. It is not known if there are any markers remaining in this plot
