Cumberland Presbyterian Church-New Zion-Located on section twenty-six, Moniteau township, was organized August 11, 1871, by W. W. Branin. The names of original members were Martha J. Miller, Catherine Lawson, Nancy Holloway, Harriet J. Holloway, Joseph Pierce, Margaret A. Thompson, L. C. McDaniel, Henry Bowers, P. P. Lawson, Caroline R. Bowers, Thomas L. Pierce, Susan J. Williams. The number of present membership is 100. Names of pastors are W. W. Branin, James E. F. Robertson and C. W McBride.

This church was built in 1879, and is a frame building, erected at a cost of \$800. Number of scholars in Sabbath school is fifty; superintended by H. B. Sappington. The Sabbath school is sustained only during the summer months.

New Zion. Cumberland Presbyterian Church, is located in Moniteau township and was organized in 1871 by W. W. Branin, its first pastor. In 1883 it had a membership of 100. "The church, now standing here, was built in 1879. The building is in good repair. There is a good fence around the cemetery, adjoining the church yard and it is kept mowed. The earliest burials, on record, were in the 1800's one possibly in 1871."
