**Cemetery:** There is a cemetery associated with this church.

**Area:** Southeast quarter of the northeast quarter of the section Along north edge of Section about a mile southwest of the site of Prairie Lick Station on the MK&T Line.

**Records:** Records are lost for the Methodist Church, but are available for the Presbyterian Church of Prairie Lick. The Prairie Lick Presbyterian Church Records were donated to the Western Historical Manuscript Collection, Columbia campus. They have been microfilmed. Portions of those records were transcribed and are available on line.

### History:

#### **Prairie Lick Methodist Church From "Prairie Lick Cemetery Records"**

These few facts about the Prairie Lick Church were given by Mr. Thomas Bryan in 1974. He said that his grandfather had given the deed to the land for church and cemetery. No date recalled. All records of the church and burials in the cemetery appear to have been lost. It seems that the church came under the jurisdiction of several denominations among them the Methodist Episcopal Church. Old records indicate that the building was sold and property deed to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The date is not known.

In 1886, the building had been used as a Grange building. It was purchased by members of the First Presbyterian Church in Boonville in order to form a local congregation for the faith. Thus began the Prairie Lick Presbyterian Church. It was known to have remained in existence until at least 1899.

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
