### Sudden Death.

Sam Rennison died very suddenly near Elk Lick; Friday evening, July 27, we learned from Mr. Simon Hunt, who was in the city Monday. He was thirty years old and had been sick but a few days of fever when he was attacked with congestion of the bowels. He was a son of the late Mr. Rennison who owned Elk Lick and considerable land surrounding. Sam Rennison leaves a wife and one child and his death is greatly regretted by his neighbors and friends and his bereaved family deeply sympathized with. He was buried at Miller's church on Saturday evening last. He was a big strong robust man and would have been the last thought of to die so suddenly. His father, the elder Rennison, who owned the Springs, will be remembered as having, when quite an old man, a few years ago, gone to Sedalia and married a woman he had only met on that trip. He did not live long after this marriage. The woman agreed after his death to waive all her claim to the estate for \$250 dollars cash in hand. This was paid her but she afterward brought suit for several thousand dollars but was defeated. Wade Land, who married Sam Rennison's sister gave Mr. Hunt the account of his sudden death. Mrs. Rennison, the widow of the deceased, was a Miss Hooper. Sam Rennison was born and raised at Elk Lick and was widely known in that part of the county.
