 Sunday afternoon at 3:40 o'clock.

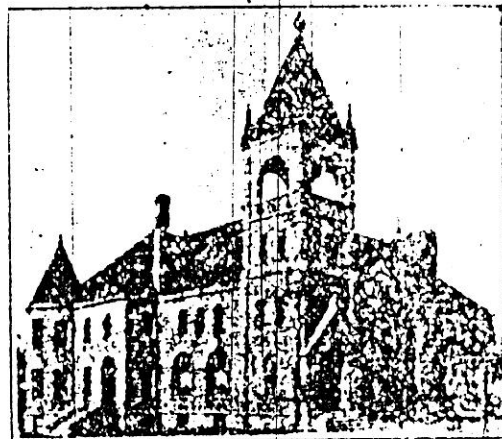
Besides her husband, she is sur-
