CURRENT EVENTS

The Federal income tax went into operation Nov. 1, and immediately developed numberless complexities which the treasury department has since been engaged in straightening out.

The situation in Mexico continued to be a leading topic during the past week. An imaginary "ultimatum," an application to France for "mediation", offers from Carranza and the usual raft of diplomatic rumors, kept the Mexican pot boiling during the week. Support of President Wilson's position seems to be general throughout the country, but the Mexican problem seems far from being solved.

Nine men accused of conspiring to assassinate the Ameer of Afghanistan were blown to death from the mouths of large cannon in the presence of a great crowd at Kabul, the capitol.

General Felix Diaz, who took refuge in Havana after fleeing from Mexico to avoid assassination, was attacked by a Mexican on the Malecon, a fashionable promenade at Havana, who stabbed him twice, inflicting serious but not fatal injury. A curious complication has grown out of it in the arrest of Diaz, for shooting the fellow who tried to kill him.

The squadron of nine United States battleships, on its way to visit Mediterranean ports passed the Rock of Gibraltar last Thursday morning.

Francis M. Cockrell of Missouri, former United States senator, was confirmed as a member of the Board of Ordnance of the War department. His salary will be \$5,000 per year. He is 79 years old.

Col. Theodore Roosevelt arrived at Buenos Ayers on a gunboat from Montevideo. He was met by American minister, members of the diplomatic corps and officers of the army and navy.

Gov. Ralston of Indiana called out the entire state militia of 2,000 men to quell disorder in connection with the strike of street car men at Indianapolis where there had been a complete tie-up for over a week. Gov. Ralston, however, succeeded in
