

HARRIS SMITH DIES.

Harris Smith, the 17-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. I. Smith, of Howard county, died at St. Joseph hospital in this city Monday morning. The remains were taken to Howard county for burial, the following young friends of the family accompanying the body to the train as pall-bearers: Harry T. Manion, Albin Schmidt, Norbert Smith, Will Brokmeyer, Fritz Yeager and Joseph Burger.

More than a week before, the young man was brought here for an operation after Dr. Ravenswaay had been called to the Smith home to see the boy. He immediately made arrangements for his removal to the hospital here for an operation with the hope that his life might be saved, but it was too late. Peritonitis developed after the operation and the boy began to grow worse until his death Monday morning.

Harris was a young man of much promise; was of high character and exalted ideas of manhood. He is survived by his father, mother, two brothers and one sister. These surviving members of the family have the sincere sympathy of their Boonville friends in their sad bereavement.

SAD AND SUDDEN DEATH.

On Monday afternoon last, Mr. Samuel Tannebaum, a prominent merchant of El Reno, Oklahoma, accompanied by his wife, arrived in Boonville en route home from visiting relatives in Kansas and Missouri. They were guests of the Zuzak family, and on Monday night, accompanied by Mr. Herman Zuzak and sister, Miss Amy, attended the picture show at the opera house. Soon after taking his seat, Mr. Tannebaum complained of his heart, and was taken to the Zuzak residence where he died soon thereafter. The remains were taken to Wichita, Kansas, where the funeral was held, the Rev. Rabbi H. Meyer, of Kansas City, conducting services, together with the Masonic fraternity of the city of which he was a member. The Masonic lodge of his home city, El Reno, attended the funeral in a body and the business houses there were closed during the funeral as a mark of esteem and respect. Mr. Tannebaum was 59 years of age.
