

C. B. JACKSON A SUICIDE

Killed Himself by Drinking Carbolic Acid at Home in Jamestown

C. B. Jackson, who was once a prosperous farmer and an honored citizen of the Bethel-Mt. Zion neighborhood four miles south of Lupus, committed suicide at his home in Jamestown Sunday by drinking carbolic acid. He had attempted to take his life once before, so the news of his death did not come entirely as a surprise. Two years ago his oldest son, Henry Jackson, committed suicide by shooting himself. Poor health and brooding over troubles of various kinds are supposed to have caused the rash act.

Mr. Jackson was born in Carroll county seventy years ago. He is survived by his wife and three sons, Walter and Warren Jackson, of near Centertown, and Clarence, of near Oakland schoolhouse, and two daughters, Mrs. Kelley Hampton, of the Bethel District, and Miss Anna Jackson at home. Interment took place at the Mt. Zion cemetery, near Jamestown, Monday.
