J. P. LOGAN DIES SUNDAY

Former Resident of County Moved to
Kansas City Five Years Ago

J. P. Logan, formerly a resident of Cooper County living on a farm several miles south of Boonville and later living in Boonville, died at 9 o'clock Sunday night at his home in Kansas City, following an illness of several weeks.

Funeral services were held in Kansas City Tuesday afternoon and the body brought to Boonville Wednesday, the body being taken from the train to Walnut Grove cemetery that afternoon.

Mr. Logan was sixty-three years of age. Five years ago the family left Boonville for Kansas City. He is survived by his widow, who was Miss Florence Scott, and by seven children. They are: J. P., Jr., Scott, Charles, Mary and Jessie Logan, Mrs. Edward C. Bogert, all of Kansas City, Mrs. Frank Morris, of Rochester, New York.

MRS. EPH SIMMONS DIED TUESDAY NIGHT

BORN ON FARM NEAR CLARK'S
FORK MAY 2, 1859.

A Splendid Christian Woman — Is
Survived by Five Children, Two
of Them in Boonville.

Mrs. Ephraim Simmons died Tuesday night at her home on Third and Chestnut Streets, following an illness of several weeks.

Mrs. Lizzie V. Simmons, the daughter of John R. and Eliza Williams, was born on a farm near Clark's Fork May 2, 1859. She joined the Baptist Church at the age of fourteen and became a consecrated member, continuing interested in and devoted to church work until the time of her death.

She was on April 14, 1881, united in marriage to Ephraim Simmons, and to the union were born the following children: Mrs. Sam P. Gott of Chico, California, Dr. Sterling P. Simmons of Marshall, Rodney, of St. Louis, Mrs. W. E. Stone and Miss Donzella Simmons, of Boonville. Another child, Ray, died in infancy.

Mrs. Simmons was a woman of high character and lovable qualities, devoted to her family and to her neighbors. Following the death of Mr. Simmons she moved to Boonville to educate her children, returning to her farm southeast of Boonville for several years before coming to Boonville to make her home, where she has lived for the past ten years.

Funeral services will be held at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon from the Baptist Church, Rev. F. E. Cooper officiating, and interment will be at Walnut Grove cemetery.
