## FUNERAL OF SPENCER MARTIN

### St. Louis Young Man Buried at Lone Elm Friday Afternoon

One of the most largely attended funerals held at the Lone Elm Lutheran Church for many months was that of Spencer T. Martin, Friday afternoon.

Mr. Martin, a son of Ed Martin, died in St. Louis Sept. 7, following an operation for appendicitis. The body accompanied by Adolph Kahle and Andrew Smith, arrived in Boonville Friday morning and was taken to the Goodman & Boller undertaking parlors and later to the church.

The services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. W. Schoech, and the pallbearers were Ollie Theiss, Wilbur Lohse, Roy Kelsner, Raymond Kelsner, Lawrence Hosp and Harold Hosp, the young men having been members of the same confirmation class as was Spencer.

The floral offering was a most beautiful one, coming from friends in the Lone Elm community, where the deceased young man spent his boyhood, from St. Louis and elsewhere.

## FALL FROM WAGON FATAL

J. H. Albin, Boonville, Died Saturday Afternoon at 5 O'clock

Jake H. Albin, who had made his home in Boonville for ten years, died Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock, as the result of injuries sustained when he fell from his watermelon wagon at the corner of Main and Morgan Streets, his head striking the pavement. He was rendered unconscious and was taken to the office of Dr. P. E. Williams for treatment and later to St. Joseph's Hospital.

Mr. Albin was born seven miles southeast of Boonville September 27, 1858, and spent his entire life in Cooper county. He was married about fifty years ago to Miss Rebecca Cartner. Four children, two sons and two daughters, were born to this union. The two sons, Leslie and William Albin, of Kansas City, survive, as do the wife, two brothers, Ben and James Albin, of Clarksburg; two sisters, Mrs. Rachel Cobb, Clarksburg, and Miss Mollie Albin, of the Mt. Hermon neighborhood.

Rev. O. M. Rickman, of Boonville, conducted funeral services for Mr. Albin Tuesday morning at the Mt. Hermon Baptist church, followed by interment in the church cemetery. Mr. Albin was a consistent member of the Mt. Hermon Church and was a man of upright character.
