OLD INJURY FATAL.

Arthur E. Westcott, Hurt in July,
1929, Succumbs.

Arthur E. Westcott died at 7:05 this morning at the home of his sister, Mrs. E. V. Saylor, 109 South First avenue, from injuries suffered in July, 1929, when he fell from a load of hay at his farm home near Blooming Prairie, Minn. Mr. Westcott fell on his back and shoulders, causing injuries to the spine from which he suffered for more than eighteen months. He was brought to the home of Mrs. Saylor six months ago.

Mr. Westcott was born in Timber Creek township, Feb. 18, 1882, a son of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Westcott, old residents of Marshall county. He made his home here all his life, with the exception of seven years spent on the farm near Blooming Prairie. Prior to going to Minnesota, he was in the employ of the C. A. Dunham Company here for eight years.

He was married Oct. 14, 1912, at Hudson, Wis., to Miss Anna A. Pearl, of Montour. He is survived by his wife and the following brothers and sisters, William Westcott, Rockford, Ill.; Myron Westcott, Denver, Col.; Fred Westcott, Harper's Ferry; Mrs. W. Van Artsdalen and Mrs. S. B. Douth, Independence, Mo.; Mrs. E. V. McDonald, Pocahontas; Mrs. Bertha Waltz, Blooming Prairie, Minn., and Mrs. Saylor, of this city.

Mr. Westcott was a member of the Red Men and Modern Woodman lodges.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Tuesday from St. Paul's Episcopal church, in charge of Rev. W. D. Foley. Interment will be in Riverside.
