Mrs. W. O. Cole, wife of prominent farmer died at their home in the Mt. Nebo community, Friday morning at about 3:30 o'clock after an illness of several months.

She was a daughter of the late Anthony James and Evaline Ewing Cole and was born February 22, 1872, on the old Read homestead near Pilot Grove. On March 18, 1891, she was married to William Dow Cole, the first 3 years of their married life was spent near Otterville since then they have resided on the same farm in this community.

Besides the husband she leaves to mourn her loss 3 sons, Noel, Clarence and Carl, all living in the Mt. Nebo community. One brother, F. C. Read. Four sisters, Mrs. Eva Marling, Mrs. Ewing Titsworth of Holden, Mo., Mrs. Sallie Cole of Sedalia, and Mrs. Blanche Turner of Los Angeles, Calif. She also leaves two grand children Polly Jane and William Dowe Cole. Funeral services were held from the New Lebanon Presbyterian church of which she was a member.
