Mrs. Harry Schmidt Died Suddenly Mon.

Heart Attack Was Fatal While She
Was Driving An Automobile

Mrs. Harry Schmidt, wife of Harry L. Schmidt, who is employed at the Dascomb-Daniels Lumber Co., died from heart disease Monday afternoon about 4 o'clock in her car about 3-4 miles east of the Clark's Fork store.

She was accompanied at the time by two little girls, Mary Frances Haley and Annabelle Loesing. One of the little girls stated the car started to leave the road and she called Mrs. Schmidt's attention to it. Mrs. Schmidt lifted her hand to turn off the ignition and she fell against one of the girls. They thought she had fainted and one of the girls stayed with her and the other went for help.

Death occurred instantly, it was stated.

Fannie Logan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Logan of near Prairie Home, was born on March 2, 1895, and she lived there until the time of her marriage to Mr. Schmidt of Clark's Fork on November 7, 1917. They lived in Boonville for the past five years.

Besides her husband she is survived by one son, Harry Urban Schmidt, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Logan, one brother, Urble.

Mrs. Schmidt was a member of the Walnut Grove Christian church, having joined when she was a child. She was very active in church work, was a member of the Missionary society, and sang in the choir.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Walnut Grove church with the Rev. H. C. Clark in charge.

Burial was in the cemetery there.

Well-Known Pilot Grove Doctor Dies

Dr. W. S. Barnes, Who Had
Practiced For 33 Years,
Passes Away

LARGE CROWD AT FUNERAL SERVICES

Last Rites Conducted Wednesday by Rev. Dubois; A Friend To Many

Dr. W. S. Barnes, prominent and esteemed Cooper county physician of Pilot Grove, died Monday evening after a lingering illness of about 12 weeks. Dr. Barnes passed away at St. Joseph's hospital after several operations and a number of blood transfusions had been performed in an attempt to combat his illness.

Funeral services were held at the Barnes home Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. Rev. H. H. S. Dubois, pastor of the M. E. church, South, conducted the services. Interment was made in Pilot Grove cemetery.

For 33 years Dr. Barnes had traveled the exacting road of a country doctor and had endeared himself to many in Pilot Grove and community.

William Silas Barnes, son of the late Elizabeth Pemberton Barnes and Dr. Hannibal Tabler Barnes, was born July 4, 1871, near Marshall, Mo. He moved with his parents to Pilot Grove when a boy and was educated at Pilot Grove College Institute. He then attended the Beaumont Medical School in St. Louis where he graduated in 1900. He came that year to Pilot Grove to engage in the practice of medicine with his father for a number of years. He was united in marriage April 20, 1918, to Miss Mary E. Tutt, of Bunceton, Mo., who, with their son, Billy, and daughter, Betty, survive him. He is also survived by 3 sisters, Mrs. De Etta Marr, Mrs. Edverda Richey and Mrs. Stella Simmons, all of Pilot Grove.

The death of Dr. Barnes, whose life was spent in service to his community, is a personal loss to many.
