Distribution of federal foods in Cooper county will be made this week through the C. W. A. committee and the welfare department. This food is being supplied to counties for distribution among the poor.

Purchase of the foods by the government is a method of using up the surplus of farm products. About \$13,000 worth of this food is expected to be sent to Cooper county.

Flour, butter, salt pork, canned corned beef, canned roast beef and cracked wheat cereals are included in the federal foods. A few additional food supplies have been purchased the welfare department, according to Mrs. I. N. Waller, superintendent.

Applications for these foods should be made through Smith Simrall, chairman of the C. W. A. committee, or to E. A. Williams, secretary. The food is being taken by truck to various supply stations located in the different townships in the county. Men have been appointed to be in charge of the different depots.

### COUNTY TAX REVENUES LESS THAN IN 1932

Kansas City, Mo., Published figures from county collectors' offices in Missouri indicate that anticipated tax revenues are somewhat below those of 1932. With a state deficit of some million and a half dollars, the prospect is not bright for tax payers, and the outlook has aroused many to actively oppose municipal ownership projects throughout the state.

Should the state legislature pass the proposal now under consideration to allow sub-divisions of the state to vote bonds for city-owned light, water, gas and sewage systems, it would mean still higher taxes necessary to retire the bonds, as well as additional tax levy to replace the six million dollar estimated tax revenue lost, because these city businesses would pay no taxes to the city, county, state, schools or nation.
