## Sees Ruse In Greek

### Aid Program

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., April 14 (AP)—Russia charged today that the Truman administration was trying to conceal the "unilateral character" of the Greek-Turkish aid program through a belated effort to stamp it with "the trademark of the United Nations."

In a sweeping attack on the Truman program, Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet deputy foreign minister, told the security council that the amendment proposed in the U. S. Senate by Sen. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) only "underlines the unilateral character of the proposed aid."

Gromyko referred to Vandenberg's proposal that U. N. organs could call a halt to the aid when, and if, the U.N. was able to supply the needed aid itself.
