Rites Are Held For Albert Adair

PRAIRIE HOME, May 15—Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon at the Prairie Home Baptist church for Albert Adair, 62, who died Friday afternoon May 11, at a hospital in Fulton following a period of failing health for several years.

The Rev. V. L. Vaughn had charge of the rites, and funeral arrangements were by the Hornbeck Funeral Service. Burial was in the Providence Cemetery. Pallbearers were A. J. Lacy, Jr., John H. Adair, Barton Wolfe, Martin Warmbrodt, Thornton Cofer, and Martin Odneal.

Albert Preston Adair, son of John B. and Clara Carey Adair, was born a few miles north of Prairie Home on August 22, 1888. He became a member of the Providence Baptist church when a young boy. He was married a number of years ago to Miss Cora Childs, who with the one daughter, Lucille, survives. He is also survived by three brothers, and one sister; Arch and Wilson C. of Wooldridge; Russell, of Prairie Home; and Mrs. Hattie Bottoms, of Boonville, R. F. D. and a number of nieces and nephews. A brother and a sister and his parents preceded him in death.

Illness Fatal To Miss Ida Chancellor

NEW FRANKLIN, May 15—Miss Ida Lee Chancellor died at the home of her niece, Mrs. Glen Amick, at 9 o'clock yesterday morning. She had been ill for several weeks.

Funeral services will be held at Clark's Chapel tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. H. E. Burton conducting the rites. Duncan-Hall funeral service is in charge of arrangements.

Miss Chancellor was a lifelong member of the Clark's Chapel church.

She was born Dec. 7, 1862, on a farm near Clark's Chapel, and after her parents, Joseph and Sarah Lee Chancellor, died, she moved with her sister, Miss Betty Chancellor and Miss Josie Chancellor to New Franklin where Miss Josie taught the first grade in the New Franklin schools for many years. Both these sisters preceded Miss Ida Chancellor in death.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Lilly Cason of New Haven, Mo., three nieces and one nephew; and two half-brothers, Willie Whitten of Clark's Chapel community, and Ack Whitten of New Franklin.
