

## Mrs. Jennie Pulley Drowns in Pond Near New Lebanon

Mrs. Jennie Teresa Pulley, age 62, was found dead in a farm pond near her home in the New Lebanon community Monday morning about 9 o'clock. The body was discovered by a son, Garnet Pulley, after his mother failed to return from the pasture where she had gone to milk a cow. The pond is about a half mile from the home.

Coroner's deputy Bob Painter termed the death "probable accidental death by drowning."

Funeral services will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Hays-Painter chapel in Pilot Grove, the Rev. Robert Ropp of Bunceton officiating. Burial will be in the New Lebanon cemetery.

Pallbearers are L. J. Kempf, Robert Stone, J. A. Mayfield, L. J. Stone, Thomas Stone and Leonard Long.

Survivors include five sons, Garnet Pulley of the home, Marvin Pulley of Fulton, George Pulley and Kenneth Pulley, of Syracuse, and Jessie Pulley of Bunceton; one daughter, Miss Mary Pulley, of the home; three sisters, Mrs. Louis Kempf of Pilot Grove, Mrs. Lester Stone of Clifton City and Mrs. Leonard Witcher of Alton, Ill., two brothers, Leo Altermott of Burk, Idaho, and Henry Altermott, of Wallace, Idaho; and one grandchild.

Mrs. Pulley was born on a farm near New Lebanon, December 14, 1897. She was the daughter of Eugene and Clara Beck Altermott.
