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in Space Program

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Moving swiftly to wind up its work before President Johnson's visit Tuesday, the U. N. General Assembly yesterday approved a broad program for co-operation in exploring outer space.

The 111-nation forum also issued a new challenge to Communist North Korea to accept U. N. terms for Korean unification.

The space program, calling for international co-operation in the peaceful exploration of the solar system, represents the largest Soviet stride to date toward President Kennedy's proposal for a joint U. S.-Soviet manned expedition to the moon.

President Johnson renewed the offer through Adlai E. Stevenson two weeks ago, but the Russians have made no formal reply. Johnson is expected to reaffirm U. S. support for the United Nations in a brief appearance here Tuesday, but there has been no indication on whether he will discuss the proposed joint moon shot.

The Russians reportedly have told U. S. officials privately they want more time to study the proposal.

Stanley Schlotzhauer, 71, a resident of the Pilot Grove community, died unexpectedly at his home this morning.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2 p.m. Monday at the Wesley Chapel Methodist church with the Rev. E. R. Pfeiffer of Vandalia officiating, assisted by the Rev. Damon Hudson. Burial will be in the Wesley Chapel cemetery.

Mr. Schlotzhauer was born November 1, 1892, near Pilot Grove. His parents were Henry R. and Catherine Karrs Schlotzhauer. On October 28, 1914, he was married to Martha Haley at Pilot Grove. Mr. Schlotzhauer engaged in farming and had spent his entire life on the Schlotzhauer home place southwest of Pilot Grove. He was a lifelong member of the Wesley Chapel Methodist church. For 28 years he had been associated with the Cooper County ASC.

Surviving are his widow of the home; one daughter, Mrs. E. T. Humphreys, of Boonville; two brothers, Wesley Schlotzhauer, Pawhuska, Okla., and Frank Schlotzhauer, of Marshall; one sister, Mrs. Ida Sly, of Pilot Grove; and five grandchildren.
